2. Entry Fees are \$3 per class.
3. Adult exhibitors must have a valid membership with the Warren Agricultural Society. Membership can be purchased at registration for \$5.
4. All animals should be on the grounds by 9:00 a.m. for show registration.
5. All animals must be properly tethered and/or penned. Limited pens are available on a first come/first serve basis.
6. Exhibitors to park in designated areas only.
7. Exhibitors are responsible for any damage, injuries or liabilities caused by their livestock. Must show proof of insurance at time of registration.
8. All sheep must have C.F.I.P. identification tags in their ear upon arrival at the Fairgrounds.
9. Purebred and commercial animals are allowed.
10. Sheep may be shown in halter if the exhibitor is under 12 years of age or where specified.
